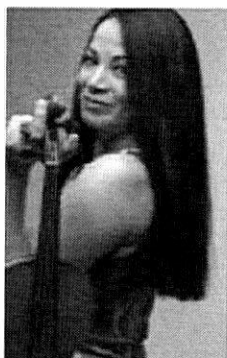
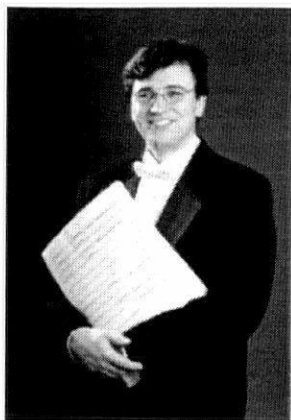
Alain Trudel, Conductor

Alain Trudel has been Principal Conductor of the CBC Radio Orchestra since 2006. In that same year he also became Principal Conductor and Artistic Director of the Orchestre Symphonique de Laval, and Artistic Advisor for the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra. Since 2004, he has also been conductor of the Toronto Symphony Youth Orchestra.

First known to the public as a trombone soloist, M. Trudel made his debut at the age of 18 with Charles Dutoit and the Montreal Symphony. He has been guest soloist with major orchestras in world music centres of five continents, including Berlin, Paris, Hong Kong, Vienna and Warsaw.

In Canada he has conducted orchestras in Toronto, Vancouver, Ottawa, Montreal, Hamilton, Halifax, Victoria, Kitchener-Waterloo. He has also participated in the Montreal International Jazz Festival.

Alain Trudel teaches conducting and orchestral literature at the Glenn Gould Professional Music School, and trombone at the Conservatoire de Musique de Québec à Montréal.

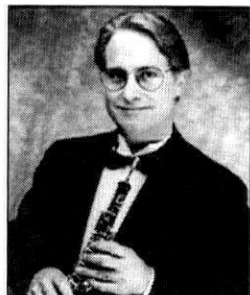


Mayumi Seiler, Violin

Mayumi Seiler conducts a busy international solo and chamber music career from her home base in Toronto. She has appeared in Europe, Asia and North America, as soloist with the City of London Sinfonia, the Royal Philharmonic, the Berlin Symphony, the Moscow Symphony, the Hong Kong Philharmonic, the Australian Chamber Orchestra, and the Toronto Symphony. She has recorded extensively for Virgin Classics and JVC Victor labels. In 2006, Ms. Seiler was a member of OCTAGON. Born of Japanese and German parents, she began playing violin at the age of three, and studied at the world-renowned Mozarteum while growing up in Salzburg. Ms. Seiler now teaches at the University of Toronto and the Glenn Gould School. With the support of a private benefactor, she plays a J.B. Guadagnini violin, dated from about 1740.

Roger Cole, Oboe

Roger Cole has been Principal Oboe of the CBC Radio Orchestra and the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra since 1976. He is also Principal Oboe and Soloist with the Carmel Bach Festival in California, and has participated in summer festivals at Aspen, Tanglewood and Marlboro. Mr. Cole teaches at UBC and the Vancouver Academy of Music. He is also Musical Director and Senior Orchestra Conductor of the Vancouver Youth Symphony Orchestra. His recently published CBC recording is entitled *AThe Expressive Oboe@*. Mr. Cole studied at the Julliard School under the renowned American oboist, Robert Bloom.

Formed in 1938, the CBC Radio Orchestra is renowned as an ensemble of passion, versatility and innovation. As North America's only broadcast ensemble, the orchestra retains the legacy of the days when radio orchestras were to be found all across North America, as they still are today in Europe.

Unique not only in its history, the CBC Radio Orchestra is also set apart by its programming. With an audience made up of radio listeners, rural and urban, throughout the country, the orchestra presents a rich musical tapestry that engages, stimulates and challenges its diverse patrons.

The orchestra's mandate is to create distinctive musical radio programmes, commission and perform works by Canadian composers, showcase Canadian performers and conductors, as well as discover and expose Canadian excellence in music. A mainstay of CBC Radio Two, the orchestra has branched out in recent seasons and now appears regularly on CBC Radio One, CBC Television and on the internet.

During its 69-year history, four conductors have stood on the orchestra's podium as Artistic Director. John "Jack" Avison, the first, was a force to be reckoned with. A talented pianist and conductor, he was polished, disciplined and musically adventurous. Following his retirement in 1980, he passed the baton to acclaimed British conductor, John Eliot Gardiner. Under Gardiner's direction, the orchestra focussed on baroque music, even acquiring a set of hand-made baroque bows, and became known as leading exponent of this captivating musical genre.

In 1993, Mario Bernardi stepped onto the podium and returned the CBC Radio Orchestra to its roots of performing more Canadian and contemporary music. Under his leadership, the orchestra became one of the finest ensembles in the country, renowned for its flexibility and sparkling interpretations. Today, under Alain Trudel's direction, it reflects the musical spirit of Canada - one of adventure, discovery and excellence.

A message from the Artistic Director

As you can see, we are starting out the New Year with a musical bang.... – two concerts in a row, and both hugely significant events for White Rock Concerts.

Our first January concert gives us the chance to bring back Alain Trudel to the White Rock stage. When he first came here, three years ago, he was guest conductor. Now he returns in the prestigious post of Musical Director of the CBC Radio Orchestra. It's nice to be able to say "we knew him when...."

Three hundred and eighty one White Rock subscribers voted, along with thousands of CBC listeners from Coast to Coast to Coast, to help select the programme. The repertoire is all wonderfully familiar, but I venture to say that in M. Trudel's hands and with soloists Mayumi Seiler and Roger Cole, the "Baroque evening" will take on a unique freshness. By the way, neither of our soloists is new to White Rock Concerts: Ms. Seiler appeared here with her *Via Salzburg* orchestra five years ago, and Roger Cole joined me in one of our earliest "*Winter Winds*" concerts in the 2003-2004 season.

The CBC Radio Orchestra and I go back a long way, too. In the 1950's and '60's, before I launched my own solo career, I was a regular member of this noble band, working under the tireless baton of pioneer broadcaster, pianist and conductor, John Avison. In those early days we gave as many as 39 broadcast concerts each year! So perhaps you can guess why it gives me such particular pleasure to welcome the CBC Radio Orchestra to our stage.

In contrast to the CBC programme, Susan Platts and Rena Sharon will be presenting some glorious repertoire which is not that often heard. In Gustav Mahler's four *Songs of a Wayfarer* (in its original version for voice and piano) we will hear some of the most deeply personal vocal writing of this turn-of-the-century master. Poignant and intense, (some would venture - maniacal,) this is the sort of repertoire that can only be achieved through a true musical partnership and collaboration of singer and pianist. Ms. Platts and Ms. Sharon performed the same programme last month in Montreal. On January 18th, it will be White Rock's turn!

P.S. A note from the historical past: On that original 1777 performance of the Handel Water Music, on the river Thames barge, the makeup of the orchestra was vastly different from what we hear these days. Wind instruments predominated in those glory days..... One report tells of 40 oboes and 20 bassoons – and I suppose a few strings, thrown in for good measure. (to the orchestra, not the water). King George I was so enamoured of the first performance that he insisted on the musicians playing the entire suite three times. Duly impressed with that massive wind sound, Handel's oboe player, Johan Ernst Galliard, wrote a celebratory fugue for 48 bassoons and four contra bassoons. Now there's a prospect for "*Winter Winds*" one year! We could start out with a parade down Granville St. in downtown Vancouver, in columns of four – virtually every bassoon player in Canada!

Susan Platts, Mezzo-soprano



British-born Canadian mezzo-soprano Susan Platts brings a uniquely rich and wide-ranging voice to concert and recital repertoire for alto and mezzo-soprano. She is particularly acclaimed for her Mahler and Bach interpretations, which she has performed with orchestras around the globe. In May of 2004, as part of the Rolex Mentor and Protégé

Arts Initiative, world-renowned soprano, Jessye Norman, chose Ms. Platts to be her protégée, selecting her from 26 candidates world-wide. Since then, she has had the honour of mentoring with Ms. Norman.

During past seasons, Ms Platts has appeared with many orchestras, including the Philadelphia Orchestra, Teatro alla Scala, CBC Radio Orchestra, L'Orchestre de Paris, American Symphony Orchestra, NAC Orchestra, Toronto Symphony Orchestra, Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, Les Violons du Roy, the Oregon Bach Festival, and the Detroit Symphony. She has collaborated with various conductors including Christoph Eschenbach, Pinchas Zukerman, Sir Andrew Davis, Leon Botstein, Yoav Talmi, Mario Bernardi, Peter Oundjian, Bramwell Tovey, Helmuth Rilling and Itzhak Perlman.

Ms. Platts has also appeared on many of America's most distinguished art song series, including the Vocal Arts Society at the Kennedy Center, the "Art of the Song" Series at Lincoln Center, and the Frick Museum recital series. She has recorded Mahler's Song of the Earth for Fontec Records, with Gary Bertini conducting the Tokyo Metropolitan Orchestra; a CD of dramatic sacred art songs with Dalton Baldwin; Mahler's Songs of the Wayfarer with the Smithsonian Chamber Players and Santa Fe Pro Musica for Dorian Records, and Brahms songs with viola obligato, Opus 91 with Steven Dann and Lambert Orkis on the ATMA label.

Rena Sharon, Pianist

Among Canada's foremost chamber musicians, pianist Rena Sharon has worked with an amazing roster of distinguished artists including Ben Hepner, Steven Isserlis, Gary Hoffman, Scott St. John, Pamela Frank, Sharon Kam, Steven Dann, Douglas Boyd, Kevin MacMillan, Richard Margison, Marina Piccinini, Shauna Rolston, James Somerville, Martin Beaver, James Ehnes, Susan Platts, Wendy Nielsen, Benjamin Butterfield, Jean Stillwell, Amanda Forsyth, and Jerome Hines. Recent tours include performances in the Czech Republic, Slovakia, and Mexico with Jozef Luptak and Gabriela Demeterova, in Montreal and California with violin virtuoso Lara St. John, and recitals in Kigali, Rwanda under the auspices of the Canadian Embassy. She is founder and Artistic Director of The Song Circle, an innovative performance company dedicated to the art of song and in addition to her concert schedule, Ms. Sharon is sought-after as lecturer on Art Song topics, and Chamber Music.



Currently the Professor of Collaborative Piano Studies at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver, and recipient of the 2000 Dean of Arts Award, she is also Artistic Co-Director of the Young Artist Experience (www.nareainstitute.org), an interdisciplinary chamber music summer program blending intense music training with a spectrum of science, humanities, arts, and social responsibility studies. She is the founding Artistic Director of the Vancouver International Song Institute.

AND WHEREAS White Rock Concerts this season will celebrate 50 years of consecutive concert presentations in our community;


