#### Chanticleer

Called "the world's reigning male chorus," by *The New Yorker* magazine, and named 2008 Ensemble of the Year by Musical America, Chanticleer will perform more than 100 concerts in 2008-09, the GRAMMY Award-winning ensemble's 31st Season. Praised by the San Francisco Chronicle for their "tonal luxuriance and

crisply etched clarity," Chanticleer will tour to 27 states across the United States this season, including appearances at Walt Disney Concert Hall under the auspices of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art and Chicago, for the Chicago Symphony. In July 2008, the ensemble performed at prestigious festivals in France, Germany, Poland and Latvia, and will make its debut in the People's Republic of China in May, 2009.

Chanticleer — based in San Francisco — has developed a remarkable reputation for its vivid interpretations of vocal literature, from Renaissance to jazz, and from gospel to venturesome new music. With its seamless blend of twelve male voices, ranging from countertenor to bass, the ensemble has earned international renown as "an orchestra of voices."

Named for the "clear-singing" rooster in Geoffrey Chaucer's Canterbury Tales, Chanticleer was founded in 1978 by tenor Louis Botto, who sang with the group until 1989 and served as Artistic Director until his death in 1997. Artistic Advisor Joseph Jennings joined the ensemble as a countertenor in 1983, and shortly thereafter assumed the title of Music Director which he held until 2008. In 2008, tenor Matthew Oltman was named Music Director.

Chanticleer is a non-profit organization, governed by a volunteer Board of Trustees, administered by a professional staff with a full-time professional ensemble, and in the USA is recipient of funding from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Grants for the Arts/San Francisco Hotel Tax Fund.

Founder: Louis Botto (1951 - 1997) Website - www.chanticleer.org Chanticleer lends its signature sound to a program demonstrating the diversity of song in the Americas . "Wonderously Free" was one of the earliest known American songs, written by Francis Hopkinson — a friend of George Washington and a signer of the Declaration of Independence.

Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah: In its traditional form, this was and still is a popular hymn sung widely throughout the world. It first appeared in 1745. Here, the original text is set to a plaintive Appalachian melody.

Jefferson: This epitome of the colonial spirit — both patriotic and sacred — has text based on a biblical poem from the Revolutionary War in 1779.

David's Lamentation: William Billings was the first American composer to publish a book of original works, the New England Psalm Singer (Boston, 1746). This hymn appeared first in his Singing Master's Assistant (Boston, 1770).

Soar Away: This piece by A. M. Cagle first appeared in the 1930s in The Original Sacred Harp. Although a "new" work, Cagle has captured the essential features of an older style.

Circumdederunt me dolores mortis: As early as 1523, a music school was established in the Spanish regions of the Americas where Native Americans were instructed in four-part harmony. By 1530, choirs in Mexico were regularly singing polyphony at Sunday Mass. Such sophisticated music-making predates the English regions by over a century.

**Credidi:** Another great American composer to spring from this rich choral tradition was Don Juan de Lienas. Credidi, one of Lienas' finer compositions, is a setting of Psalm 115 for eight parts in two choirs.

Two Madrigals [edited with feeling by P.D.Q. Bach]: During the Golden Age of the English madrigal it was not uncommon for pieces by different composers to be published together under a single title such as The Triumphs of Oriana. This practice inspired an 18th-century nobleman, Count Pointercount, to launch a similar collection of his own as a tribute to his wife Thusnelda, a singer who had recently triumphed over earthly cares by holding a high note so long that she died of asphyxiation, com-

plicated by a lack of sufficient oxygen. Similarly, the two madrigals, Schickele No. 1601, were written during the final Contrition Period of the composer's life, when P.D.Q. was trying to make amends for the previous 29 years (the Soused Period) by writing in a style that seemed to him purer and more uplifting than the hybrid style of his earlier works.

Reincarnations Op.16: Samuel Barber was a triple-prodigy of voice, compositions and piano. Early in his career he wrote the slow movement of a String Quartet, later adapted for Toscanini's NBC Symphony, as the well-known Adagio for Strings. It is less known that vocal compositions were also a significant part of his work.

Night Chant: When American composers are described as "native" the definition is not usually as accurate as when applied to Brent Michael Davids, an American Indian citizen of the Mohican Nation. He has focused on his indigenous heritage, in a contemporary setting, blending Eurocentric classical techniques with native musical traditions.

The Homecoming: David Conte is Professor of Composition and Conductor of the Chorus at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. He has received commissions from Chanticleer; the San Francisco Symphony Chorus; the Dayton, Oakland and Stockton symphonies; and the American Guild of Organists.

Sleep, My Child: Conductor and lecturer, Eric Whitacre is also one of the most popular composers of his generation. His music has been praised as work of unearthly beauty and imagination, while the BBC raved: "this is music that can actually make you smile."

Stephen Foster (1826–1864): Folk music played an enormously important role in the early American experience, largely because people of the time prized the oral tradition even more than a literary one. Stephen Foster is one of America's great songwriters, and his music is often mistakenly thought of as traditional folk music. His songs were among the most popular ever written, and appealed to new Americans whether shipped to the backwaters of this new land, or fleeing poverty or political and religious oppression. Foster's name has, indeed, become synonymous with American folk music.

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
