After 59 years at the helm of White Rock Concerts, you have honoured me by naming me your Artistic Director Emeritus. Now the big problem for all of us is to figure out what an ADE is supposed to do! Certainly I am happy to continue being actively involved, and at least to feel occasionally useful. One thing we have decided - I'm going to write a blog for each concert, with various matters of interest to White Rock Concerts - maybe some of the fascinating behind-the-scenes activity that goes on in connection with every one of our concerts.

Here is a very brief word about the 2016-17 series which starts off tonight with the Lafayette Quartet. The Bergmanns have put together a wonderful mix of concerts: instrumental, vocal, and piano and a full-fledged opera to wrap things up. Underneath it all is a special kind of adhesive that holds everything together - the glue of orchestral accompaniment. Within a couple of seasons, our John Avison Chamber Orchestra may well become a permanent fixture of the Lower Mainland's vibrant concert scene.

Calm seas and a smooth performance up ahead!

#### Lafayette String Quartet

The Lafayette String Quartet celebrates its 30th anniversary in 2016 (Hence the selection of the Haydn Quartet #30 to open their programme). Many quartets enjoy such longevity, but the Lafayette is possibly the only Quartet on the international touring scene which has retained the same personnel from the day of its formation in 1986 to the present day.

Established as artists in residence at the University of Victoria since 1991, the Lafayette Quartet has performed across Canada, the United States, Mexico and Europe. Besides teaching and performing at the university, the Quartet's numerous concerts and outreach activities contribute significantly to musical life in the city of Victoria. They have received honorary doctorates from University Canada West and in 2010 they were given the inaugural Craigdarroch Award for Excellence in Artistic Expression from the University of Victoria.

Formed in Detroit in 1986, the Lafayette worked closely with two of the world's most esteemed quartets—the Amadeus and the Alban Berg—and were encouraged and mentored by the violinist Rostislav Dubinsky of the legendary Borodin Quartet.

Prior to coming to Canada, The Lafayette Quartet was the winner of the Grand prize at the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition and received laureates at the Portsmouth International String Quartet Competition, and the Chicago Discovery Competition as well as the prestigious Cleveland String Quartet Competition.

The Lafayette Quartet has an extensive discography on the Dorian, Centrediscs, CBC and Lafayette labels. The Quartet is also the subject of David Rounds' book The Four and the One: In Praise of String Quartets, published in 1999.





The Members of the Lafayette String Quartet are Artists-in-Residence at the University of Victoria School of Music, Faculty of Fine Arts in British Columbia. The Lafayette String Quartet is managed by Lydia Kasianchuk, Artists' Manager.

The quartet Opus 33, No. 2 by Joseph Haydn is subtitled "The Joke" and is dedicated to the Grand Duke Paul of Russia. Premiered at a gala Christmas celebration, it was quickly revealed that Haydn was playing an exuberant musical joke on his patron and the Viennese public. Listen for the "joke" at the end of the final movement. Rules of concert etiquette have been cheerfully shattered, ever since the first Viennese audience erupted in laughter at the premiere in 1781.

Dmitri Shostakovich's String Quartet No. 7 in F-sharp minor (Op. 108) was composed in 1960 in memory of his first wife. Russian classical music flourished in the late 19th century as composers concentrated on creating a distinctly national voice. Shostakovich found the Quartet a perfect outlet for his intense expression, and produced 15 quartets over forty years. The Quartet No. 7 was written at the height of his creative output and at the peak of his dangerous personal feud with Soviet authorities. Its three movements, are performed without break, and at approximately 13 minutes, it is Shostakovich's shortest quartet.

Maurice Ravel completed his only String Quartet in F major in early April 1903 at the age of 28 and he unashamedly modelled it on Claude Debussy's String Quartet. Although the ultra-conservative French music establishment didn't take kindly to Ravel's unconventional ideas, by 1904 it was already clear that Ravel was the outstanding French composer of his generation. The Quartet was dedicated to Ravel's teacher Gabriel Faure who encouraged him and recognized his significance in the 20th century French music scene.





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
